Measuring the performance and impact of community indicator systems: Key performance indicators and evaluation

Content: There is growing interest in developing Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). However, developing indicator systems and KPIs is not sufficient. Measuring the impact of community indicator systems for causing community change is important for sustaining such systems. This webinar delved into the following goals: Demonstrate the value of KPIs and evaluation to community indicator systems; Present the KPI framework drafted by the International Institute for Sustainable Development (IISD) for Peg - a community indicators system for Winnipeg, Canada; Discuss the merits and possibilities of applying KPIs and evaluation to community indicator systems.
